

This fiscal year, the Friends funded Family Author Night programs for seven Redwood City grammar schools. The evening, open to students and their families, features a book giveaway and a presentation by the book's author or illustrator.

At the Fair Oaks event pictured above, Elizabeth Gomez, the illustrator of the featured book The Upside Down Boy spoke. In a bilingual presentation, Elizabeth delighted the kids by showing slides of herself as a girl in Mexico and talking about the joys of creativity. At the same time, she was able to reach straight to the

parents by talking about the importance of education and family support for students. Her own parents were poor and struggled. Still, they believed so much in the power of education that they not only sent all five of their children through college, but Elizabeth's mother, who had only a 4<sup>th</sup> grade education, decided to finish grade school, high school, and finally college! It was a powerful message, charmingly delivered. Thank you to the Children's department for their dedicated work organizing these programs.
